

Tour Report Colombia Bird Photography 15 – 27 September 2024

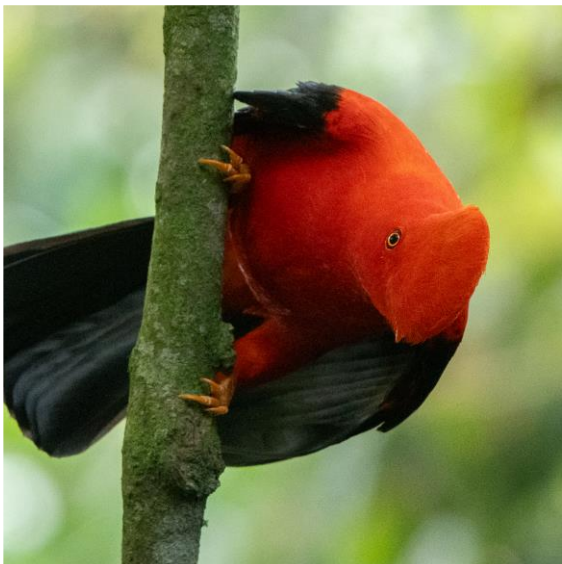

Our bird photography adventure in Colombia was nothing short of spectacular! From the vibrant gardens of Bogotá to the misty cloud forests of Manizales, we captured stunning images of some of South America's most iconic and elusive bird species. Highlights included close encounters with no fewer than nine species of antpittas, once considered near-mythical, and an astonishing 45 species of hummingbirds that graced our lenses throughout the trip. The abundance of dazzling endemics and local specialties, from the Andean cock-of-the-rock's dramatic displays to the rare and beautiful buffy helmetcrest, made for unforgettable photographic opportunities.

Day 1:

Monday 16 September 2024

Arrival in Bogotá, Observatorio de Colibires, Bogotá

After our arrival in Bogotá, we set off for a short transfer to one of the city's nearby lush garden retreats, the *Observatorio de Colibríes*, located on the outskirts of the capital. This delightful spot provided our first immersive experience with Colombia's vibrant birdlife, offering an early taste of the country's extraordinary avian diversity. Some of the highlights from the day include: Longuemare's sunangel, black-tailed trainbearer, green-tailed trainbearer, blue-throated starfrontlet, sword-billed Hummingbird, great Sapphirewing, and white-bellied woodstar.

Day 2:

Tuesday 17 September 2024

Transfer from Bogotá to Jardín and cock-of-the-rock lek, Jardín

Our morning began with a transfer to El Dorado International Airport, where we boarded a flight to Jose Maria Cordova International Airport in Medellín. Upon arrival in Medellín, we embarked on a scenic 4-hour transfer to Jardín, a picturesque town nestled in the southwest region of Antioquia.

After reaching Jardín, we immediately set out to explore one of the area's most famous natural attractions - a lekking site for the Andean cock-of-the-rock. The lek was lively and raucous, with males calling and displaying their striking orange plumage. Strategically placed viewing platforms offered us excellent vantage points to observe the action, and we spent a rewarding time soaking in the vibrant spectacle. We were fortunate to witness the dramatic displays of up to 15 males at once.

Day 3:

Wednesday 18 September 2024

Excursion: Bird photography at Las Ventanas and cock-of-the-rock lek, Jardín

We began our day with an early start, heading out in 4x4 vehicles along a rugged track towards the remote Las Ventanas Reserve. We were fortunate to witness several distant flyovers of the yellow-eared parrots, we caught brief but exhilarating glimpses of these rare birds in flight.

We had plenty of time to enjoy photography and hummingbirds at mirador El Roble reserve, some of the highlights include: sparkling violetear, tourmaline sunangel, speckled hummingbird, long-tailed sylph, tyrian metaltail, bronzy inca, collared inca, buff-tailed coronet, fawn-breasted brilliant, and white-bellied woodstar. After breakfast we had the chance to visit the local antpitta feeders where we had excellent views of slate-crowned antpitta, chami antpitta, and chestnut-naped antpitta.

In addition to the amazing birds, as an unexpected bonus, just before we departed, we were fortunate to have a rare sighting of an oncilla, which appeared at the feeder near the house, offering us a thrilling views of this elusive wild cat.

After lunch, we returned to Jardín and spent the final part of the afternoon at the cock-of-the-rock lek, where we once again marveled at their stunning displays. Some other bird species recorded around the lek include red-bellied grackle and Andean motmot.

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Day 4:**Thursday 19 September 2024**

Excursion: Breakfast bird photography session close to jardin

We had breakfast at a private garden just a short drive from town and spent the better part of the morning there enjoying the birds at the local feeders. Some of the highlights from this morning include acorn woodpecker, red-crowned Woodpecker, Andean motmot, western emerald, blue-necked tanager, scrub tanager, flame-rumped tanager, and white-naped brushfinch.

Afterwards, we headed toward our next destination ... the city of Manizales where we stayed for three nights.

Day 5:**Friday 20 September 2024**

Excursion: Full day at el color de mis reves, manizales

Today, we explored the breathtaking El Color de mis Rêves Forest Reserve, situated in the mist-covered elfin and bamboo zone forest. We spent most of the time at hummingbird and fruit feeding stations near the main camp where we had plenty of photography chances with species like tourmaline sunangel, long-tailed sylph, collared Inca, buff-tailed coronet and lacrimose mountain tanager. We also visited an antpitta feeding station, where we enjoyed incredible views of the stunning bicolored antpitta.

Day 6:**Saturday 21 September 2024**

Excursion: Full day of bird photography in Rio Blanco, Manizales

Early this morning, we set off for a full day of birdwatching in the pristine cloud forest of Rio Blanco, just a 35-minute drive from our base. Our primary focus for the day was observing and photographing the secretive antpittas, a specialty of this region. Rio Blanco boasts several feeding stations specifically set up for these elusive birds, giving us the opportunity to see up to four different species.

We were fortunate to have excellent views of the elegant chestnut-crowned antpitta, the endemic brown-banded antpitta, the more elusive bicolored antpitta, and the smaller slate-crowned antpitta. Each of these species provided remarkable photo opportunities as we moved from feeder to feeder.

After an exciting morning in the forest, we returned to the lodge for a relaxing lunch. The veranda and the lodge surroundings offered stunning views of the cloud forest, and we enjoyed watching a lively array of hummingbirds in the gardens, including long-tailed sylph, tourmaline sunangel, collared inca, bronzy Inca, and a pair of distant black-billed mountain toucans.

We were also fortunate to encounter several flocks of the rare and endangered rusty-faced parrot feeding near the lodge, which was a fantastic way to end our day.

Day 7:**Sunday 22 September 2024**

Excursion: Photography session at Hacienda del Bosque, Manizales

This morning, we continued our ascent into the higher elevations of the central Andes, making a stop at the welcoming Hacienda del Bosque, a private cattle farm that has preserved patches of stunning Andean forest. The farm offered excellent opportunities for both breakfast and lunch, as well as some incredible bird photography.

Our main focus were the elusive antpittas, and we were fortunate to see the equatorial antpitta and the tiny, remarkable crescent-faced antpitta. The hummingbird feeders were a hub of activity, attracting a dazzling array of species. One of the most sought-after hummingbirds, the sword-billed hummingbird, made several

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appearances, showcasing its extraordinary bill. Other species frequenting the feeders included the buff-winged starfrontlet, sparkling violetear, purple-backed thornbill, and tourmaline sunangel.

After a successful morning at Hacienda del Bosque, we continued our journey upward, as we made our way to our lodge in Nevado del Ruiz. The rough, bumpy road took us through altitudes as high as 4,000 metres, offering us stunning high-altitude scenery before arriving at our next base for a three-night stay.

Day 8:

Monday 23 September 2024

Excursion: Bird photography on the Páramo and Termales del Ruiz, Manizales

After a hearty breakfast at our beautiful mountain lodge, we started our day visiting the local antpitta feeding station where we were treated to fantastic close-up views of the elusive tawny antpitta. After the antipitta excitement we loaded up the bus and set off for an exciting day of birdwatching in the paramo—a unique high-altitude tropical habitat above the treeline. Our main target for the morning was one of the most remarkable hummingbirds of the region, the buffy helmetcrest, a Colombian endemic with a striking crest and purple beard. This bird is not only a highlight of the tour but also a rare species, and we were thrilled to spend the best part of morning searching for it.

Our team knew just the right spot, and with a short walk along a 60-metre path, we were able to position ourselves perfectly to observe and photograph this incredible bird. The buffy helmetcrest didn't disappoint, offering unforgettable views.

After returning to the lodge for lunch, the afternoon was spent relaxing and photographing the birdlife around the lodge gardens and feeders. The hummingbird feeders were attracting a spectacular lineup of species. We had excellent opportunities to capture images of shining sunbeam, rainbow-bearded thornbill, golden-breasted puffleg, great sapphirewing, and mountain velvetbreast.

The gardens didn't only attract hummingbirds, though. We also enjoyed stunning views of mountain tanagers, including the scarlet-bellied, hooded, and lacrimose mountain tanagers, as well as the dazzling golden-crowned tanager.

In between photography sessions, there was plenty of time to relax in the natural thermal hot springs at our lodge, Hotel Termales del Ruiz.

Day 9:

Tuesday 24 September 2024

Transfer to K18(Cali area) and Laguna de Sonso Reserve

After a hearty breakfast, we set off on the long drive to our next destination, winding our way down the mountainside and through the lush, fertile Valle del Cauca. We made a stop at the Laguna de Sonso, one of the last protected wetland sites in the valley, where we enjoyed excellent birdwatching. Among the highlights were the endemics grayish piculet and apical flycatcher, spectacled parrotlet, snail kite, pied water-tyrant, and anhinga. Although photography opportunities were somewhat limited, the unique wetland habitat offered a distinct environment compared to previous locations.

Another highlight of the day was a very cooperative parrot snake, which gave us plenty of photographic opportunities.

As we continued our journey, we were treated to the beautiful Colombian countryside before arriving at our final bird photography base: a small private reserve nestled in the lush cloud forests of Colombia's western Andes.

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Day 10:**Wednesday 25 September 2024**

Excursion: Full day at Doña Dora

Today marked by far our busiest and most rewarding day in terms of species diversity and bird abundance. We set off on a full-day excursion to “Doña Dora” an area and place that promised a completely different suite of mouthwatering species. Doña Dora, a roadside café perched on a ridge with an incredible vista, where a set of fruit and hummingbird feeders awaited us.

The feeders were bustling with activity, offering a true feast for birdwatchers and photographers. Here, we encountered a stunning array of species, including silvery-throated, rufous-throated, golden, glistening-green and flame rumped tanagers, blue-winged and black-chinned mountain tanagers. The hummingbirds were particularly abundant, with notable sightings of empress brilliant, velvet-purple coronet, green thorntail, purple-throated woodstar, purple-bibbed whitetip and white-whiskered hermit.

Another highlight was the magnificent toucan barbet, a regional specialty with its uniquely striking plumage. This was undoubtedly one of the day's highlights.

Other exciting sightings included the red-headed barbet and red-faced spinetail. The abundance of birds at this place made for a truly exceptional day.

Day 11:**Thursday 26 September 2024**

Excursion: La Florida Reserve

After an early morning coffee and hot chocolate, we set off for La Florida to enjoy bird photography. A short drive took us to a private reserve, where we encountered an exciting array of species.

The fruit and seed feeders were exceptionally productive, attracting a variety of species such as Colombian chachalaca, flame-rumped tanager, golden-naped tanager, golden tanager, saffron-crowned tanager, red-headed barbet, and acorn woodpecker, all of which were frequent visitors. The multicolored tanager, an endemic species and the main target for the day was a regular visitor to the feeders, providing us with several opportunities for stunning shots. With the help of a local guide, we enjoyed superb close-up views of chestnut wood-quail and little tinamou, allowing us to capture excellent photographs of both species.

The highlight of the day, however, was a fantastic hummingbird photography session at the recently renewed photography station, where we had the chance to take many photos of several species, including white-booted racket-tail, tawny-bellied hermit, fawn-breasted brilliant, bronzy inca, collared inca, speckled hummingbird and purple-throated woodstar, all visiting the feeders. The combination of beautiful light and diverse birdlife made for a productive and enjoyable day.

Day 12:**Friday 27 September 2024**

Excursion: Bird photography session at San Felipe Reserve

Our final morning was spent enjoying some relaxed bird photography around the lodge grounds. We visited several bird feeders, including a grain feeder, where we had excellent views of a chestnut wood-quail family. Fruit feeders were also productive, attracting a good variety of species, including golden tanager, flame-rumped tanager, golden-naped tanager, saffron-crowned tanager, and black-capped tanager. Other highlights included Colombian chachalaca, orange-billed nightingale-thrush, red-headed barbet, acorn woodpecker, white-naped brushfinch, and blue-winged mountain tanager.

After lunch, we concluded our photography trip with a visit to a reflection pond feeder, where we had the opportunity to photograph a green honeycreeper.
