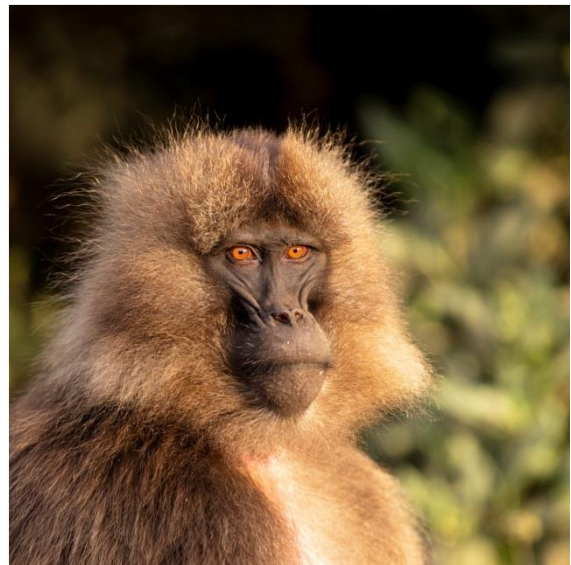
# Ethiopia – A Unique Wonder

**Day 1: Depart UK**

**Friday 7 February 2020**

**Day 2: Arrive Addis Ababa**

**Saturday 8 February 2020**

I picked up members of our group from the airport, amongst a flurry of activity related to the African Union Conference, as delegates from across the continent gathered in Addis. After some time relaxing in the hotel we headed out to Lucy's restaurant for our first taste of Ethiopian food and the traditional coffee ceremony.

Afterwards we headed to the national museum and the university; however, unfortunately a power outage limited our opportunity to explore these locations. Ahead of our early start the following morning and after the overnight flight, we had dinner at the hotel and an early night.

**Day 3: Travel to Simien Lodge, Simien Mountains**

**Sunday 9 February 2020**

Up promptly, we flew to Gondar, where we stopped in the centre of the city for coffee before continuing our journey to Debark, taking in the views en route. We ate our lunch in Debark, which had been ordered in advance (while national park paperwork was being sorted), after which we went quickly on our way. We continued our climb to the Simien Mountains. After quickly checking into the lodge we headed out into the surrounding area and found a troop of geladas to spend the rest of the afternoon with, until they eventually headed down the cliff faces to their sleeping sanctuaries.

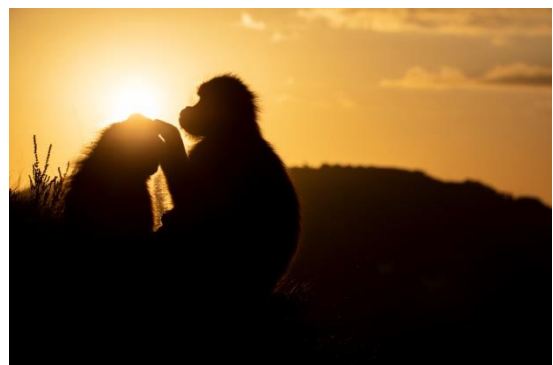
**Day 4: Full day exploring, Simien Mountains**

**Monday 10 February 2020**

We headed out before dawn to a nearby viewpoint which looks out over the dramatic plateau edge and watched the sunrise. Focusing on big-vista landscape photography and also floral details, we started to get a feel for this special environment. Returning to Simien Lodge for breakfast and a well-earned coffee, our next task was to head out and find a group of geladas to spend much of the morning with.

We stopped briefly to talk and photograph a farmer we encountered high up on the plateau, and who was using horses to separate the grain from the crops. Pressing on, we found a group of geladas to spend a few hours with, watching their behaviour. Building on this interaction, at 11am we met up with American researchers who are studying the geladas and gave us an insight into their behaviour. We then returned to the lodge for lunch.

In the early afternoon we laid out some bones and were quickly rewarded with circling lammergeier, lappet-faced vulture, steppe eagle and thick-billed ravens coming in to land and feed. As we meandered back towards the lodge we found another group of geladas to spend the rest of the afternoon with, taking in a beautiful sunset with a troop which were grooming before moving to their sleeping sanctuary. Ahead of our evening meal the gelada researchers gave a presentation to our group about their work and offered up further geladas insights.



**Day 5: Full day exploring, Simien Mountains**

**Tuesday 11 February 2020**

This morning we drove to Debark, a journey of about 3 hours or so, including a few stops on the way to take in the views as we explored more of the Simiens. Above Debark campsite we came across five rare walia ibex amongst the stunning high-altitude vista. They were a real treat to witness. Our picnic location

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was surrounded by circling thick-billed ravens and lammergeiers which gave the group further time to photograph these beautiful birds as they came down to feed.



As we neared the lodge we found another group of geladas to spend some time with, before a relaxing evening at the lodge.

**Day 6: Gondar experience**

**Wednesday 12 February 2020**

A prompt morning getaway meant that we had descended to Gondar Hills Resort in time for lunch. Meandering down to the city we explored in and around Fasilides' Castle and Fasilides' Bath, learning about Gondar's history. We also visited the enchanting Debre Birhan Selassie Church which gave us a taster of the cultural experiences yet to come in Lalibela. For dinner we ate at the Four Sisters restaurant, which offers a wide range of delicious Ethiopian food.

**Day 7: Exploring Lalibela**

**Thursday 13 February 2020**

We had a direct morning flight to Lalibela and hotel. **Day 8: Full day, Lalibela**

**Friday 14 February 2020**

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An early getaway got us to Yemrehanna Kristos Church in a cave 1.5 hours away via our coaster bus. The half-hour walk uphill and early start was worth it as we had the church to ourselves – a truly memorable experience. This gave the group time and space to set up photographs and have a more relaxed experience.

On our return journey to Lalibela we stopped at a settlement and had a fantastic experience gaining an insight into countryside life. The guests loved this genuine experience as it was reciprocated by our hosts who enjoyed the novelty of it.

Returning to Lalibela we had a buffet lunch at a nearby restaurant. We then visited the remaining churches in Lalibela, enjoying a more relaxed experience than the afternoon before, with some great photographic opportunities. For dinner we headed back to Ben Ababa restaurant.

**Day 9: Fly to Awassa**

**Saturday 15 February 2020**

Today we took a flight from Lalibela to Addis, where we had a 4-hour layover. I gave some of the group photography lessons as we waited. Our connecting flight arrived in Hawassa about 4pm. We opted to drive straight to a black colobus monkey location, allowing the guests to get a rare intimate view of a habituated group. We remained there until sunset and then went to our hotel for dinner.

**Day 10: Drive to Bale Mountains**

**Sunday 16 February 2020**

In the morning we took in the fish market at Awassa, where marabou storks walk amongst fishermen, as people feed scraps to pelicans patiently waiting nearby. We then continued with our long drive to the Bale Lodge. Once there, we stopped at the park headquarters to eat the packed lunch that had been made for us by the hotel. We spotted some endemic antelope during our travels, and caught brief views of mountain nyala, olive baboons and warthog, as well as some swarms of locusts. We arrived at the lodge in the late afternoon. The group then settled into their rooms before returning to the main building for dinner.

**Day 11: Full day, Bale National Park**

**Monday 17 February 2020**

We drove up to the Sanetti Plateau, spotting black colobus monkeys and taking in the dramatic vistas en route. We also saw various other endemics, including blue-winged geese, white-collared pigeon, black-headed siskin and ruddy shelduck. We returned to the lodge for a late lunch. The afternoon was then spent around the lodge, either doing some personal exploring, or with me doing some landscape photography, with a particular focus on long-exposure photography.

**Day 12: Full day, Bale National Park**

**Tuesday 18 February 2020**

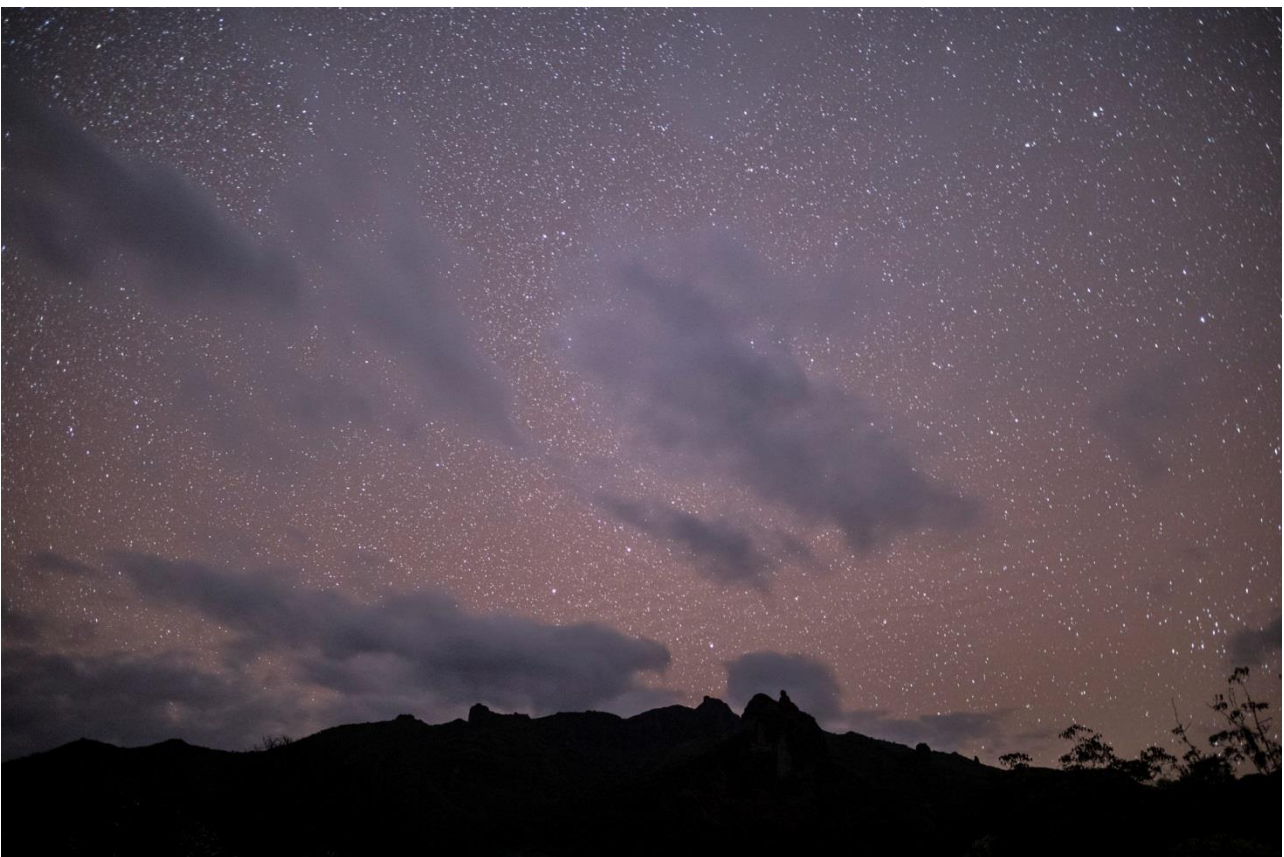
Today we enjoyed a full day up on the plateau. We met up with two members of EWCP (Ethiopian Wolf Conservation Programme) who walked around with us on the plateau, helping us to spot and shadow two wolves. It was on the way to meeting the EWCP members though that we had my best wolf encounter, as one individual walked alongside the road and past all of our vehicles – a special moment. We found out that the population has fallen by an estimated 75% in under a year due to canine distemper and rabies spread by domestic dogs which are coming up to the plateau with herders who are illegally grazing livestock in the area. We had a packed lunch on the plateau, where Mustafa, a community outreach officer, gave us an eye-opening insight into the Ethiopian wolf population and situation.

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We returned to the lodge mid-afternoon to relax after our high-altitude exertion (4,000 metres). We enjoyed the beautiful views as we descended from the plateau and the cloud cover broke up. A spontaneous macro-shoot with an obliging chameleon was a welcome surprise. After dinner a number of the group joined me for some astrophotography, taking advantage of the incredible clear night sky.



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**Day 13: Full day, Bale National Park****Wednesday 19 February 2020**

We had an early start this morning, for a dawn chorus walk around the lodge with local guides who offered expert birding knowledge. Mid-morning many of the group went to a nearby waterfall, taking in a pleasant walk and trying waterfall photography. We had lunch at the lodge, and many members of the group went to watch honey-collecting – a man climbed a tree to a manmade hive, smoking out the bees and collecting fresh honeycomb for the guests to try; they also created a photo-story of the event. Three members of the group went back to the plateau and were lucky with further wolf sightings.

**Day 14: Drive back to Addis Ababa & depart****Thursday 20 February 2020**

Leaving at 7am it took us all day to drive back to Addis, with various brief stops along the way and a packed lunch made by the lodge. We had a final evening meal at a restaurant close to the airport where we watched traditional dance and music before heading to the airport and flying back to the UK, arriving early the following day.

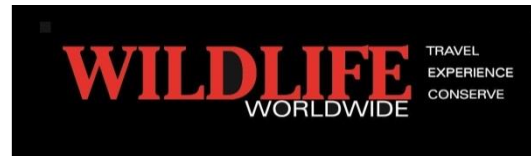
