

## Tour Report Chile's Rare Mammals 14 - 26 February 2023

### **Day 1: Tuesday 14 February 2023**

Arrival in Puerto Montt.

### **Day 2: Wednesday 15 February 2023**

Today was clear, with little wind. We saw Peale's dolphin, South American sea lion, and birds such as Humboldt penguin and Peruvian pelican on the ferry to Chiloé Island. Inside Parque Tepuhueico, we saw pudú, flocks of slender-billed parakeet, solitary huet-huet, and a very fast green-backed firecrown. The clients decided not to search for kodkod this evening and instead had an early night.

### **Day 3: Thursday 16 February 2023**

During the day, we found Southern pudu and birds such as rufous-legged owl, ringed kingfisher, and chucao tapaculo. We searched for mammals towards the waterfall and the forest of Mañíos without success, sadly.

### **Day 4: Friday 17 February 2023**

This morning was clear, with very little wind. We left early for the Puñihuil pelagic and saw mammals such as the Peale's dolphin, two fin whales and a South American sea lion colony. Birdwatching was also successful, with pairs of kelp goose, flightless steamer duck, Magellanic penguin, black-browed albatross, white-chinned petrel, red-legged cormorant, sooty shearwater, pink-footed shearwater, common diving-petrel, and southern giant petrel among others.

### **Day 5: Saturday 18 February 2023**

Today was partly cloudy with no wind in the morning, turning cloudy in the afternoon with small gusts of wind and rain. We navigated from Quellón through the Yaldad Fjord and found marine otter, small colonies of South American sea lions, and several Peale's dolphins.

### **Day 6: Sunday 19 February 2023**

Today was sunny, and we spent it searching for a unique mammal - river otter. Sadly, luck wasn't on our side, however, we saw various birds, including green-backed firecrown, cocoi heron, peregrine falcon, ringed kingfisher, slender-billed parakeet, wren-like rushbird, spectacled tyrant, many-coloured rush-tyrant.

### **Day 7: Monday 20 February 2023**

The wind had picked up overnight, meaning we had to stay by the coast today. This provided us with plenty of bird activity, with Coscoroba swan, Chilean skua, Magellanic penguin, and black-browed albatross all noted.

### **Day 8: Tuesday 21 February 2023**

We left for Tierra del Fuego today, however, we were unable to go out on deck on the ferry due to the strong gusts of wind. Despite this, we were still able to see Peale's dolphin. On arrival on the island, we saw herds of guanacos and a beaver in the king penguin colony. Various birds made an appearance, such as Chilean flamingo, magellanic penguin, the Andean condor, short-billed miner, common miner, and the beautiful king penguin.

### **Day 9: Wednesday 22 February 2023**

It was cloudy to begin with, however, this soon cleared in the afternoon. On the way to Torres del Paine we saw chilla fox, Chilean flamingo, Andean condor, southern caracara, and a pair of great-horned owls.

### **Day 10: Thursday 23 February 2023**

We left at dawn to find pumas inside the park and were greeted by three individuals at 06:00. An alpha male named Dark was feeding on a guanaco along with two cubs of about a year old, who kept their distance from the male at all times. We also found a culpeo fox while having lunch in the western part of the park at noon.

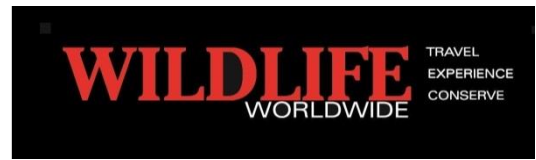
### **Day 11: Friday 24 February 2023**

Today was action-packed, and we ended the day with a herd of almost 300 guanacos! We heard their alarm, and it turned out that there were three pumas, a female with two young! We also saw dozens of Andean condors, black-chested buzzard-eagle, white-throated caracara, austral parakeet, long-tailed meadowlarks, and black-chinned siskin.

### **Day 12: Saturday 25 February 2023**

On our last day we were able to tick more birds and mammals of our list, with rhea, Humboldt's hog-nosed skunk, large hairy armadillo and chilla fox making an appearance. We then transferred to Santiago for the group's flight home.
