## Wild Colombia's Mammals & Birds

18 February - 6 March 2023

### **Day 1: Saturday 18 February 2023**

Today the group departed the UK for Colombia.

### **Day 2: Sunday 19 February 2023**

The majority of the group arrived on the direct flight from London Heathrow. We were soon on our way out of Bogota and dropping down onto the plains of the Eastern Llanos, close to Villavicencio. On arrival at our first lodge, we enjoyed some introductory birding, which included a fine selection of species such as bare-faced ibis, spot-breasted woodpecker, swallow tanager, oriole blackbird, brown-throated parakeet, straight-billed woodcreeper and chestnut-eared aracari, not to mention various warblers, swifts, flycatchers and sparrows. A king vulture drifting overhead was the icing on the cake!

In the afternoon we visited a nearby private reserve, where we enjoyed a delicious local lunch prepared by our welcoming hosts, washed down with a local tropical fruit juice - *lulu*. Excellent birds continued to flow with great views of great potoo, scaled piculet and speckled chachalaca. Here too, we found our first mammal target of the tour: a family of endemic Brumback's night monkeys! Having enjoyed a cracking first day, we made our way back for a restful night in our lovely hotel.

### **Day 3: Monday 20 February 2023**

After an early morning cup of coffee, we set off before dawn and arrived at our first location: a small private reserve. Here we enjoyed great views of endemic ornate titi monkeys as they vocalised just metres above us! We also saw the recently split Colombian squirrel monkey - a new addition to Colombia's 'endemic primate club'. Early birds included a rare glimpse of cinereous tinamou and grey-cowled wood-rail. Later we enjoyed a fantastic walk across open savannah with fringing forest. Birds came thick and fast, with notable sightings including green ibis, western osprey, savannah hawk, double-striped thick-knee, both lined and cream-coloured woodpeckers, red-bellied macaw, orange-winged parrot, and red-breasted meadowlark. A little further on, we stopped at a small marshy area which attracted rufescent tiger heron, little blue heron, wattled jacana, lesser yellowlegs, a solitary sandpiper and a white-headed marsh-tyrant, amongst many others. Our walk ended back at the reserve's small house, where we enjoyed a cup of coffee before making our way to a local restaurant for a delicious *llanero* lunch.

After a few hours relaxing back at the hotel, we set out to explore several small lakes which proved to be a magnet for a range of spectacular birds such as scarlet ibis, roseate spoonbill, Amazon kingfisher, purple gallinule, both black-bellied and white-faced whistling ducks, and black-crowned night heron, to mention only a few. Moving on, we found a large group of hoatzin, ringed kingfisher, limpkin, laughing falcon and bat falcon. However, our main target for the afternoon was a truly iconic mammal - the incomparable giant anteater. We eventually found no less than five individuals! An absolutely incredible way to end what had been a truly memorable day filled with colourful birds and iconic mammals!

### **Day 4: Tuesday 21 February 2023**

Our day started with a short transfer to the nearby Bosque Bavaria reserve, and along the way, we had a look at a fasciated tiger-heron as it stood solemnly beside a fast-running river. Our first birding produced some interesting species including rufous-breasted hermit, fork-tailed woodnymph, plain-brown woodcreeper, rufous-breasted wren, many-banded aracari, Amazonian motmot, white-chinned jacamar, gilded barbet, cobalt-winged parakeet and pectoral sparrow!

Back at the hotel, we enjoyed a relaxed breakfast before setting off back to Bogota, where we would spend the night. Along the way, we had good views of crested oropendula at our lunch stop. Having made good progress, there was time to visit a local wetland reserve on the outskirts of Bogota, where we had excellent views of Brazilian guinea pig (a possible future split) as well as adding a couple of Colombian endemic birds

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to our list - including the extremely localised Bogota rail and the skulking silvery-throated spintail. We also enjoyed a feast of water birds including blue-winged teal, Andean duck, pied-billed grebe and striated heron. From here we made our way back to our comfortable hotel for a restful night.

#### **Day 5: Wednesday 22 February 2023**

A short flight across the Magdalena Valley saw us arrive in the Central Andean city of Pereira. From there we drove north to a spectacular coffee *finca* (plantation), where we enjoyed relaxed birding amongst the fringing forest and shaded coffee groves. Notable new species for the tour included squirrel cuckoo, both steely-vented and speckled hummingbirds, Andean motmot, blue-headed parrot, spectacled parrotlet, thick-billed euphonia, russet-crowned warbler, crimson-backed tanager, scrub tanager and many others! A tasty al fresco lunch followed, before we enjoyed a short tour of the plantation, birding as we went and learning about coffee growing. The tour concluded with a tasting session - delicious! From there, we transferred into the high Colombian Central Andes, to an excellent mountain lodge that would be our base for the next three nights. The wonderful hot pools, fed by naturally occurring thermal springs, would prove a fantastic way to relax after our wildlife outings over the coming days.

#### **Day 6: Thursday 23 February 2023**

A beautiful bright morning saw us heading up the mountain in search of rare high-altitude birds, under the slopes of smoking Nevado del Ruiz - the volcano after which the national park is named. With scenic photos of said volcano in the bag, we climbed ever higher, easily passing 4,000 metres. Our big bird target of the morning was the highly range-restricted and much sought-after buffy helmetcrest - a hummingbird that occurs only over 3,600 metres. Helmetcrest activity was low, but we enjoyed views of other nice birds including brown-backed chat-tyrant, Andean tit-spinetail, streak-throated bush-tyrant and Andean siskin. As we patiently waited for any sign of our quarry a shape loomed above us and the entire group was suddenly transfixed by a male Andean condor as it glided right in front of us - magic!

Having stuck to our helmetcrest task for some time, we decided to enjoy a cup of coca tea in the ranger station and continue our vigil from a balcony which commanded good views across the sprawling *páramo* habitat. This decision was eventually rewarded as a male buffy helmetcrest showed up seemingly from nowhere. A frantic chase ensued, but thankfully everyone got mind-blowing views of this special bird as it fed on low flowering shrubs. Mission complete, we started to make our way back down towards the hotel, making a short stop in some good elfin forest along the way. Here, we came across a small mixed-species feeding flock, including such stunners as golden-crowned tanager, golden-fronted whitestart, pale-naped brushfinch and lacrimose mountain tanager. Our incredible morning was rounded off at the lodge's hummingbird garden, where we enjoyed close-up views of rainbow-bearded thornbill, shining sunbeam, buff-winged starfrontlet, golden-breasted pufflegs, great sapphirewing and Tyrian metaltail in and around the beautiful grounds.

We had covered a lot of ground over the last couple of days, so everyone was happy to be left to their own devices for the afternoon, with some enjoying the thermal pools, while others spent the afternoon birding, and some did both!

#### **Day 7: Friday 24 February 2023**

Freshly brewed Colombian coffee (surely the best coffee in the world!) helped with our early start this morning. We set off downslope to the wonderful cloud forest reserve of Hacienda el Bosque. Following a tasty breakfast, we spent some time at a couple of antpitta feeding stations where we enjoyed fine views of the recently split Equatorial antpitta and the simply stunning crescent-faced antpitta. Throughout the morning, we enjoyed other forest species such as black-crested warbler, black-capped hemispingus, hooded siskin and many others. More hummingbird feeders attracted a dazzling array of these addictive birds, which included tourmaline sunangel, mountain velvetbreast and the incomparable sword-billed hummingbird! Our next stop was at a fruit feeding station which attracted grey-breasted mountain

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toucans, both Andean and sickle-winged guans, white-throated quail-dove and a couple of red-tailed squirrels! It had been another memorable morning, packed to bursting with spectacular birds and striking mountain scenery.

Following another tasty lunch, we made our way back up towards our mountain hotel, with a couple of stops along the way for some nice birds such as stout-billed cinclodes, American kestrel and broad-winged hawk.

### **Day 8: Saturday 25 February 2023**

Much of the day was spent relocating to our next destination: the threatened, yet rich, forests of the Magdalena Valley. However, before setting off, we enjoyed a short pre-breakfast walk which included some nice hummingbirds such as black-thighed pufflegs, shining sunbeam and rainbow-bearded thornbill. Other new birds for the tour included both white-browed and Azara's spinetails.

After a hearty breakfast we set off, dropping down the eastern slope of Colombia's Central Andes, into the low-lying mid-Magdalena Valley. Along the way we made several stops to refresh ourselves and stretch our legs, recording some nice birds like broad-winged hawk, Carib grackle, blue-and-white swallow and Neotropic cormorant. We arrived at our destination in the late afternoon, and there was just enough light to enjoy a short walk along a forested track closest to the lodge. To our great delight, we were rewarded with incredible views of a pair of rare and endemic silvery-brown (or white-footed) tamarin - perhaps our biggest mammal target for the region! What a cracking end to the day! We checked into our lovely lodge, which featured beautiful bird-rich gardens and enjoyed a relaxed evening after what had been a long travel day.

### **Day 9: Sunday 26 February 2023**

After an early breakfast, we made our way to the nearby reserve of Rio Claro, which protects a small but significant swathe of Magdalena Valley lowland humid forest and has a beautiful limestone gorge complete with a crystal-clear river (the Rio Claro) running through its heart. Having enjoyed views of rufous-breasted hermit, blue-chested hummingbird and white-vented plumeleteer on a bank of flowering shrubs, we soon found another troop of silvery-brown tamarins that were busy tucking into a breakfast of seed pods. After watching them for a while, we continued our walk through the reserve, enjoying such avian delights as chestnut-headed oropendula, green kingfisher, band-backed wren, barred puffbird, both white-bearded and golden-headed manakin, red-rumped woodpecker, olivaceous flatbill and many others! However, perhaps the birding highlight of the morning was a prolonged and scope-filling view of one of Colombia's most range-restricted endemic species: Antioquia bristle-tyrant. On the mammal front, we were delighted to find a pair of Neotropical otters swimming in the clear waters of the Rio Claro. All in all, it had been a magical morning, and after coffee and a much-welcomed ice cream, we headed back to the lodge for some downtime before and after lunch.

Later in the afternoon, we returned to Rio Claro, where we enjoyed a walk through the forested gorge to an oilbird cave, spotting a group of Colombian red howler monkeys on the way, plus a pair of spectacular yellow-throated toucans. Eventually, we reached a small river beach where we waited for the oilbirds to become active as darkness fell. In the meantime, we found a Hoffman's two-toed sloth as it started its nocturnal activities. Before long dozens of oilbirds started exiting the cave, and we all watched in amazement as they began their nighttime activities.

Having enjoyed the weird and wonderful oilbirds, we made our way back along the same path, recording a nice Boyacá spiny rat as well as getting a brief glimpse of brown-eared woolly opossum and a family troop of grey-handed night monkeys as they foraged through the forest canopy. Tired, but with beaming smiles, we returned to the lodge for dinner and a well-earned rest.

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### **Day 10: Monday 27 February 2023**

The group enjoyed a short pre-breakfast walk around the extensive lodge gardens, which included spectacled parrotlet, orange-chinned parrot, crimson-crested woodpecker, yellow-crowned tyrannulet and black-crowned tityra. We then enjoyed a relaxed breakfast before packing up the bus and transferring to Medellin airport a few hours away. En route, we stopped at a traditional restaurant which looked across spectacular Andean foothill scenery. While we waited for our food, we found another Magdalena endemic - the wonderful white-mantled barbet - and enjoyed spectacular views of the much-wanted bar-crested antshrike. It had been a great lunch stop and our food hadn't even arrived!

From Medellin, we flew to the Caribbean coastal city of Santa Marta and transferred a short distance to Minca - a small village perched in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada de Santa Marta. This special mountain range - which is isolated from the Andes - would be our home for the next four nights (including three nights in the incredible El Dorado lodge) as we enjoyed more world-class birding and mammals!

### **Day 11: Tuesday 28 February 2023**

Our little lodge in Minca was the perfect place to start our exploration. On an open balcony, we kicked off the day with a dazzling selection of birds including keel-billed toucan, boat-billed flycatcher and black-chested Jay, not to mention wonderful hummingbirds such as white-necked jacobin, steely-vented hummingbird and white-vented plumeleteer. After an alfresco breakfast, we started to bird up the mountainside, on our way to El Dorado Lodge. Along the way the special birds came thick and fast, with notable sightings including Santa Marta brushfinch, barred antshrike, band-rumped swift and scarlet-fronted parakeet.

Lunch was laid out in front of more jaw-dropping views, as well as active hummingbird and tanager feeders, and after soaking up the incredible location and its birds we continued our ascent, birding along the way and recording more Santa Marta specials such as Santa Marta blossomcrown and coppery emerald - both sought-after hummingbirds. We eventually arrived at El Dorado, our base for the next three nights. We couldn't resist the active hummingbird feeders, with the photographers delighting at blue-naped chlorophonia, both black-capped and black-headed tanagers, not to mention a mind-boggling selection of hummingbirds.

Once we had checked in and spent a couple of hours enjoying the views from our rooms, we made our way to the dining room, and on the way heard a pair of white-tipped quetzals, before later enjoying close-up views of the Santa Marta sub-species of grey-handed night monkey. What a way to end an incredible day!

### **Day 12: Wednesday 1 March 2023**

A pre-dawn start saw us ascending the mountain in our sturdy 4x4 vehicles, slowly making our way to the famous San Lorenzo Ridge. Here we enjoyed a spectacular early morning scene as the sun burst over the horizon, illuminating the snow-capped peaks of the central Sierra Nevada de Santa Marta in front of us. As the morning warmed up, so did the birds, and it wasn't long before we were enjoying a selection of fabled Santa Marta endemics which included Santa Marta warbler, yellow-crowned redstart (whitestar), both streak-capped and rusty-headed spinetails, and hermit wood-wren! Following our excellent start we enjoyed a picnic breakfast before continuing birding as we descended slowly. More notable species included scaly-naped parrot, scarlet-fronted parakeet, mountain elaenia, cinnamon flycatcher, brown-capped vireo and black-hooded thrush.

After an incredible morning in one of South America's premier birding hotspots, we had a relaxed lunch back at the lodge, followed by some relaxed time around the hummingbird feeders. Here the group enjoyed a dazzling array of hummers including both brown and green (lesser) violetears, crowned woodnymph and the endemic white-tailed starfrontlet. It had been a long day, so we spent the afternoon

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at leisure.

### **Day 13: Thursday 2 March 2023**

Our second full day was spent on birding trails a little higher up (though not as high as yesterday) in beautiful cloudforest, targeting species that we hadn't recorded the previous day. A beautiful masked trogon got the day off to a great start, quickly followed by a spectacular range of other birds that included southern emerald (Santa Marta) toucanet, golden-olive woodpecker, red-billed parrot, montane foliage-gleaner, both Blackburnian and black-and-white warblers, black-capped tyrannulet and golden-breasted fruiteater. A little further down we ran into more special birds - the highlight being the endemic Sierra Nevada brushfinch.

It had been another action-packed morning, with highlights seemingly around every corner! The afternoon was spent around the active hummingbird feeders, with an impromptu hummingbird masterclass from our excellent local guide, David. Having spent a few hours relaxing after lunch we met up at 16:00 and enjoyed some excellent birding with more trogons, toucanets and a particularly memorable encounter with a pair of white-tipped quetzals as they defended their nest against a group of marauding black-chested jays. An ice-cold beer slaked our thirst as the sun set over the Caribbean coast far below us, and we again enjoyed the grey-handed night monkeys as they emerged to feed on bananas.

### **Day 14: Friday 3 March 2023**

After a final breakfast at the wonderful El Dorado Lodge, we set off down the mountain in 4x4s, with stops along the way. Special birds of the morning included zone-tailed hawk, long-billed hermit, Santa Marta blossomcrown, rufous-tailed jacamar, black-banded woodcreeper and yellow-legged thrush. However, the highlights of the morning were the wonderful golden-winged sparrow and rosy-thrush tanager. During the descent we made a short stop at a local finca to enjoy a well-earned coffee and, as we approached, found a troop of extremely relaxed Colombian red Howler monkeys - much to the delight of the group!

Descending as far as Minca we enjoyed a relaxed lunch with excellent local fruit juices (a feature of just about every meal during the trip). Afterwards, we tried, but failed, to find a roost of spectacled owls. Artisanal ice creams went some way to soothe the pain, and thankfully we had seen the owl a few days earlier.

Our departure from Minca marked the end of this penultimate stage of the trip, and from there we transferred to our final lodge - a fantastic coastal hotel beside Tayrona National Park. After check-in, we noted plenty of new birds for the tour such as brown pelican, magnificent frigatebird and a fine selection of terns. However, the highlight of the afternoon came in the unexpected form of a pair of absolute giants! A few of the group were enjoying a drink beside the pool while scanning the waters of the Caribbean which stretched out in front of us. Suddenly a blow was seen and a hectic couple of minutes followed as we scrambled for cameras while watching a pair of what turned out to be Bryde's whales (mother and calf) cruise past just a couple of hundred of metres from the shore. Absolute magic, and undoubtedly the most unexpected mammals of the tour!

### **Day 15: Saturday 4 March 2023**

Our local ground team had organised special early access to nearby Tayrona National Park, allowing us to enter before the general public. Our first mammal encounter was with a troop of foraging Santa Marta white-fronted capuchins, as they raided a fringing orange plantation! We also enjoyed the park's abundant birdlife throughout the morning, recording white-necked puffbird, military macaw, plain xenops, fuscous flycatcher, white-bearded manakin, one-coloured becard, buff-breasted wren and orange-crowned oriole. We also encountered several exciting raptors such as great black hawk, grey-lined hawk and zone-tailed hawk. However the diminutive cotton-top tamarin was our main mammal target for the day, and after some searching we located an active troop, which we were able to enjoy for an extended period!

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The heat of the day was soon upon us, which caused our activity level to drop. A refreshing ice cream proved popular, and having thoroughly enjoyed the morning we headed back to the hotel for a delicious seafood lunch and time to relax on the coast or explore at leisure.

#### **Day 16: Sunday 5 March 2023**

On our last morning, we headed out for a short birding walk around the hotel grounds and recorded a few new species such as ruby topaz hummingbird, black-throated mango, streak-headed woodcreeper and barn swallow. We also enjoyed many of the classic coastal species that we'd been seeing over the last couple of days, such as brown pelican, Neotropic cormorant, magnificent frigatebird and Caspian tern.

After a final delicious lunch overlooking the Caribbean, we departed for the local airport and our onward connections. It had been an incredible wildlife journey through Colombia, exploring varied habitats while soaking up the abundant wildlife, with each location offering new and exciting encounters!
